If you do not like getting your hands dirty then this Industry is not for you. As a Contractor you must avoid a situation where you run projects remotely, you must go on site and be hands on. If it means you must knock off at one o' clock in the morning, then you must do that. Do not take short cuts. For us to grow we must join forces, support and empower each other". She said.
