

In between accounting to the Portfolio Committee on COGHSTA, the Department has to appear before the Standing Committee on Public Accounts, better known as SCOPA, for further accounting on its performance based on the APP and Budget.

The SCOPA is the watchdog that assesses financial statements (audit reports from the AG) of all executive organs of the state, like COGHSTA and others, oversight over Public Participation, law making, and processing of petitions

LEGISLATIVE SUPPORT IN THE OFFICE OF THE MEC

In this piece I share and focus mainly on the provincial sphere of government. We are in the provincial government services and must master how it works and appreciate our location in the labyrinth of its systems and structures.

The Limpopo Provincial Legislature is domiciled at Lebowaqomo, Lepelle-Nkumpi municipality, in the Capricorn district. In brief, the legislature passes, amends, and rescinds laws. In between its law-making duties, the Legislature holds the Provincial Executive Council to account through its oversight committees - Portfolio Committees, Standing Committee on Public Accounts (SCOPA), and the Standing Committee on Public Participation and Petition.

Annually the Department prepares the Annual Performance Plan and the Annual Budget for tabling before the august House, Limpopo Provincial Legislature, which in turn refers the APP and Budget to the Portfolio Committee on COGHSTA for consideration. During the process of consideration of the APP and Budget Vote 11 Speech, the Department led by MEC and HOD, and supported by the executive management appears before the committee to elaborate on the two planning documents.

After a thorough engagement with the Department, the

“An Epitome of Dedication and Hard Work: Acting HOD Modjadji Malahlela”

The newly appointed Acting Head of Department (HOD) for the Limpopo Department of Cooperative Governance and Human Settlements and Traditional Affairs (CoGHSTA), Dr Modjadji Melidah Malahlela was born at Ga-Mothiba near Polokwane fifty-one years ago (51). Acquired a Doctorate in Public Administration from the University of KwaZulu-Natal in 2010. She swiftly climbed the corporate ladder over the years from her humble beginnings as an Educator at Masopha High School from 1992 - 1999.

She was then appointed as Assistant Director: Planning Coordination within the Limpopo Office of the Premier from 1999-2001.


In the two (02) years she worked in the Premier's Office, Malahlela coordinated the alignment of sectoral plans, reports and monitored the implementation of resolutions of the Presidential Coordinating Council and other IGR structures. She also served as a Secretariat of the Provincial Planning Forum in the same organization.

In 2002, the then dedicated Planning Coordination Unit Assistant Director was hired as a Deputy Director in the same unit and continued with the same responsibilities at Deputy Director level.

Malahlela's vastly growing knowledge landed her the Director: Planning and Development position in the Polokwane Municipal Office a year later.

From 2003-2008, Malahlela worked at Polokwane Municipality where her duties were to manage Local Economic Development and Integrated Development Planning.

Managing Spatial Planning and Land Use Management, together with managing Housing and Building Inspections also formed part of her responsibilities as director.

In October 2008, Modjadji Malahlela relocated to Pretoria after accepting an offer for the position of Regional Executive Director at City of Tshwane. Malahlela managed the Municipal Regional Office, coordinated development planning and service delivery in the region, monitored departmental service delivery in the region while coordinating stakeholder management and partnerships until January 2011.

February 2011 marked Malahlela's appointment as Chief Director: Development Planning at the National Department of Cooperative Governance. She provided support to Provinces in coordinating and monitoring integrated development planning in municipalities. Her Chief Director duties would also include mobilizing national support for municipalities on development planning matters which she performed diligently for a year before heading to a different unit (Urban Development) within the National Department of Cooperative Governance.

From 2012 to 2016, Malahlela would facilitate the development of South Africa's urban policy framework, facilitate partnerships between South African Cities and other international cities and serve as convener of the Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa (BRICS) Friendship Cities and Urbanization Forums (South African participation).

October 2016 saw the return of Malahlela to her home Province (Limpopo), where she was appointed as Deputy Director-General: Cooperative Governance and Traditional Affairs at the Limpopo Department of Cooperative Governance Human Settlements and Traditional Affairs.

To date, Malahlela still works closely with Municipalities and her duties as DDG: CoGTA are to provide support and oversight to municipalities and the institution of traditional leadership and

support municipalities in development planning matters.

She was nominated to represent the Limpopo Province in the Statistics South Africa Council as from 2019 to date. has proven that with dedication and hard work, anything is possible.

Malahlela's job as DDG: CoGTA and extensive experience in the municipal governance sphere has led to Limpopo CoGHSTA MEC, Mr Basikopo Makamu's recommendation to appoint her as Acting Head of Department as with effect from February 2022.

BUDGET SPEECH 2022/23 HIGHLIGHTS

In keeping with the provincial targets which includes 30 732 houses, 8 435 serviced sites, 744 Rental Housing Units and 10 000 registered title deeds, the Department has poised to appoint eligible civil & structural engineers and contractors to achieve a target of 49 911 housing opportunities by 2024.

*In the last financial year, the Department committed to deliver 4 257 housing units to the qualifying beneficiaries. Despite facing numerous housing delivery challenges during the first two quarters of the previous financial year, the Department announced that as at the end of March 2022, the department has managed to recover. The Department built and handed over 4 122 houses, thus achieving 97% of its annual target. The remaining 3% of the housing units target is at various stages of construction, and completion is planned for the first quarter this financial year.

*The Department has also provided serviced sites to 2 525 households against a target of 4 098 which translate to 62%. The delay in the completion of several projects was due to lack of bulk infrastructure which necessitated the relocation of projects. All projects are currently under implementation.

The Department plans to deliver 4 895 housing units during the 2022/2023 financial year, with priority given to designated groups, namely, the aged, child-headed families or orphans, people living with disabilities and those without proper shelter. To plan better, municipalities were requested to submit 5-year development



areas. This will ensure that planning processes like geotechnical investigations, beneficiary management and clustering of units are undertaken in the preceding years to offset delays in the commencement of projects.

*The Department has started with the elimination of asbestos roofs in the province. A total of 1 500 houses will have their asbestos roofs replaced in 2022/2023 in Seshego. Currently, the department is busy with assessments in Mogalakwena and Elias Motsoaledi.

*The roll out of Community Residential Units (CRU) continues to be of the key focus of the department. In the past financial year, the department had a target of 150 CRU units in Marapong, Lephalale. The said target was not met due to payment dispute between the Implementing Agent which is Housing Development Agency (HDA) and contractors. To mitigate this challenge, the department terminated the implementation agreement with HDA and the department is managing the project. In this financial year, the department targets to complete 44 units. It is anticipated that upon completion, this project will have housed 514 families.

* The audit for 2020/2021 has been concluded in all municipalities excluding Bela- Bela.



Women in Construction

As per the report of the Auditor General (AG), in 2020/21 financial year 3 municipalities regressed, 4 improved, while 14 and 5 maintained unqualified and qualified audit outcomes respectively. Mogalakwena municipality has improved from adverse to a qualified audit outcome. Elias Motsoaledi, and Fetakgomo Tubatse progressed from qualified to unqualified audit outcomes. Waterberg District progressed from Unqualified to a clean audit outcome.

Mopani District regressed from qualified to a disclaimer audit outcome (also regressed, Capricorn District Greater Giyani municipalities). In line with the resolution of Premier's Intergovernmental Forum, CoGHSTA and Provincial Treasury will conduct a Rapid Assessment in Mopani and others to identify areas of intervention. There are also municipalities who remained stagnant namely, Vhembe District, Sekhukhune District, Ba-Phalaborwa, Modimolle-Mokgoopong and Thabazimbi municipalities. The MEC will meet municipalities that have regressed and those that have remained stagnant qualified audit

outcome.

*The Customary Initiation Act No. 2 of 2021, provides a framework for the management of initiations in the country. In compliance with this Act, the Provincial Initiation Coordinating Committee (PICC) has been established and consists of 8 members including Senior Traditional Leaders. We are confident that the Committee will administer an incident-free initiation season. The Department envisages absolutely no tolerance to illegal initiation schools and zero death at the end of this season.

*For the financial year 2022/23, a total budget available for the Department of CoGHSTA as allocated is R2 418,737 000.00 (2.4 billion), a slight increase to the previous year budget of R2.3 billion. The departmental budget allocation per programme is as follows: Administration: R325 009 000, Human Settlements: R1 287 954 000, Cooperative Governance: R281 352 000, Traditional Affairs: R524 422 000.



COGHSTA On The Helm To Maintain A Safe And Zero Death Initiation Schools' Season

After a two-year break due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the MEC for Co-operative Governance, Human Settlements and Traditional Affairs (CoGHSTA), Mr Basikopo Makamu hosted a Media Briefing on the 2022 Limpopo Initiation School Season.

The Briefing held at the Department's Headquarters on Wednesday, 22 June 2022 in Polokwane was also attended by the MEC for Health, Dr Phophi Ramathuba and SAPS Mopani Regional Commissioner Major General Willy Mashava.

During the Briefing, MEC Makamu reported the number of initiates that have enrolled at approved schools had almost doubled from 393 in 2019 to 731 2022. Out of this number, 485 are for males and 246 females. From the grand total of 731 applications received, 680 have been approved.

He also highlighted that the Department for CoGHSTA and Health are working tirelessly to ensure a safe, successful and zero death

in the 2022 Initiation Season. “We are sparring all efforts in ensuring that the lives of initiates are protected”. He said.

“The total number of approved schools are as follows per district; Sekhukhune: 458, Waterberg: 54, Capricorn: 46, Mopani: 87 and Vhembe: 35,” He reported.

Presenting the IGR Declaration, Mogalakwena Mayor, Cllr Ngoako Tauatsoala shared the same sentiments as the MEC.



RENTAL HOUSING PUBLIC CONSULTATION SESSIONS PROMOTE STABILITY IN THE RENTAL SPACE

Polokwane - On a constant quest to promote stability and harmonious relationships between landlords and tenants, the Limpopo Department of Cooperative Governance, Human Settlements and Traditional Affairs (CoGHSTA) in partnership with the National Department of Human Settlements hosted Rental Housing Public Consultation Sessions for two consecutive days.

The sessions held in Polokwane and Lephalale respectively had Real Estate agents, landlords, tenants, and officials expressing some of the challenges they face before giving inputs on the Rental Housing Regulations that are set to be implemented by July.

Giving welcoming remarks at the consultation session held at

Fusion Boutique Hotel, The Acting Deputy Director-General for Integrated Sustainable Human Settlements (ISHS), Mr Makhudu Mathunyane urged attendees to fully participate in the discussions of the day and give inputs to the Rental Housing Regulations.

Chairperson of the Rental Housing Tribunal, Advocate Letsepe Thubakgale thanked stakeholders for the impressive turn out and expressed that the regulations that are to be implemented will come into effect with the inputs that were made.

As part of Secretariat of the Rental Housing Tribunal, Mr Mantsha Manaka stated that a lot of unfair practices between landlords and tenants have been minimized through the Rental Housing Act 50 of 1999. "I am confident that with today's turnout and inputs made towards the Rental Housing Regulations, there will be more stability within the Rental Housing sphere". He said confidently.

The Housing Advisory Panel was established in terms of Limpopo Housing Act, 2006 (ACT 2 OF 2006). The Panel consists of five members who must have knowledge, qualifications or experience in the field of housing development.

The functions of the panel are: (a) To advise the MEC on the Provincial Housing Policy and Strategy and viability of all housing development plans; (b) To serve as a consultative forum for external role-players to be involved in the policy formulation process for the purpose of informed decision-making; (c) To conduct and manage investigations requested by the MEC for the purpose of informed decision-making; and (d) To perform any other function concerning housing matters which the MEC refers to the Panel.

A member of the Panel must have one or more of the following skills: (a) Sufficient knowledge of the national and provincial housing legislation; policy; and strategy; (b) Expertise in low income housing finance; (c) Technical knowledge of residential township development and housing construction relating to standards and planning; (d) Legal expertise regarding contracts and conveyancing aspects of housing development; (e) Practical experience regarding project implementation, planning, township establishment, engineering services, provisioning and costing of housing products; (f) Experience in community development and communication of the community's interest in housing development; and (g) Expertise regarding housing development in support of agricultural activities or rural development.

LIMPOPO RENTAL HOUSING TRIBUNAL – A CHAMPION FOR THE RIGHTS OF TENANTS AND LANDLORDS

In an effort to protect tenants and landlords against unfair and unlawful practices, the Limpopo Department of Cooperative Governance, Human Settlements and Traditional Affairs (CoGSHTA) established the Limpopo Rental Housing Tribunal in terms of the Rental Housing Act no. 50 of 1999.

The statutory body's objectives also include promoting the resolution of disputes without recourse to courts while ensuring timeous and effective resolution of complaints lodged. It is through this body that tenants and landlords are educated regarding their

rights and obligations.

The Limpopo Rental Housing Tribunal provides free services to tenants and landlords in the province that range from receiving and investigating complaints, the informal facilitation of agreements, resolving of disputes through mediation and hearing to provision of advice and information regarding lease agreements.

COID ACT COMPLIANCE GEARED FOR A HEALTHY WORKFORCE IN LIMPOPO MUNICIPALITIES

On a constant quest to protect vulnerable workers, the National Department of Employment and Labour in partnership with the Limpopo Department of Cooperative Governance, Human Settlements and Traditional Affairs (CoGHSTA) and other stakeholders held a seminar on the Compensation for Occupational Injury and Diseases (COID) Act. The two-days seminar was held at The Ranch Resort outside Polokwane from the 8-9 June 2022 under the theme: "Compensation Fund Working with Municipalities on COIDA to Protect Vulnerable Workers"

Reporting on the status of compliance on the COID Act, Chief Director for COID Services Julian Soupen said that Limpopo Municipalities are an impressive 78% compliant.

"The remaining percentage is due to information pending from the employer's side," he reported. Giving a message of support during the seminar, MICB's Robert Mogotsi welcomed the Department of Employment and Labour's initiative to partner with

CoGHSTA in educating municipal officials on how to comply with the COID Act and provision of guidance on the submission of claims to the Compensation Fund if there are injuries in the workplace.

South African Local Government Association's (SALGA) Provincial Operations Officer, Ledile Sebati also gave a message of support. "As SALGA, we are happy that our municipalities are compliant with the COID Act as Mr Soupen has outlined. We are more than willing to work together with the Department of Employment and Labour in these two days to ensure that 100% compliance is eventually achieved by municipalities in the province." She said.

In attendance were Councillors, Mayors, Municipal Managers, Chief Financial Officers and Officials ensured support to implement the Act at their respective workplaces to ensure 100% compliance in the province.
